Director's Report

As a core activity, we have continued to provide strategic and technical support and policy advice to our funders, the Joint Information Systems Committee (JISC) and the Museums, Libraries & Archives Council (MLA), as well as to the wider community.

A guick look at the changing information landscape reveals the Open Access (OA) philosophy gaining momentum with increased funding for institutional repository development, and we have been pleased to host Programme support for the JISC Digital Repositories Programme in what is a new departure for UKOLN. This has been a fruitful relationship with clear opportunities for facilitating further synergies with the Digital Curation Centre.

It has been hard to escape the impact of Web 2.0 technologies and we have actively promoted collaborative software, folksonomy development and a more participative approach in both the cultural heritage sector and in higher education.

The availability of greater OA content together with newly created services or "mash-ups" makes for a truly exciting prospect for innovative digital library the information in these pages both useful applications for the user community.

Achievement Highlights 2005-2006

Funding has been secured for new projects and extensions including Digital Repository Programme Support for the JISC, the Intute repository search service and the EU-funded DRIVER Project in which UKOLN is a partner. We have also been commissioned to carry out specific studies for the JISC including a Terminologies Study and a Synthesis of Shared Infrastucture Services activity.

A number of significant reports and papers have been published including a Digital Repositories Roadmap for JISC, a DLib paper on folksonomies by Marieke Guy and Emma Tonkin and a substantive chapter in the Digital Curation Manual by Michael Day.

The Grand Challenge Project started in October 2005 with UKOLN as a key partner. Project staff have put considerable effort into fostering links with research teams and developing an integrated research plan. In the nine months of the Grand Challenge Project, UKOLN has contributed considerable effort to developing the project's technical infrastructure in line with best digital curation practice, while fostering links between the various research teams. An integrated research plan and a network of industrial collaborators have

- UKOIN staff have been invited to make presentations and have had papers accepted at key international conferences and events, including the Augmenting Interoperability meeting in Washington, Building the Information Grid event organized by DEFF in Copenhagen, the Joint DELOS/TEL Meeting, Paris, OAI4 at CERN, Geneva, the German Government e-Science Forum in Berlin, the 3rd European Conference on Research Infrastructures in Nottingham, the 8th International Bielefeld Conference, Germany, the WWW 2006 Conference, Edinburgh, the EU FP7 Research Infrastructure Workshop on Digital Repositories in Brussels and the annual SCONUL Conference in Newcastle.
- UKOLN carried out a review of the indexing in the Cornucopia collections description database for MLA. Recommendations from the review were accepted and will be implemented in due course and a set of contributor guidelines was also produced.
- UKOLN continues to lead the Outreach activities of the Digital Curation Centre and was responsible for the well-received 1st International Digital Curation Centre Conference held at Bath in September 2005.
- The Events Department has organised many successful conferences and workshops such as the MICHAEL Conference and EU National









Representatives Group meeting in Bristol for MLA as part of the UK Presidency of the EU, the International JISC/CNI Conference in York, three joint British Library/JISC/UKOLN workshops and the Preservation & Value Conference in Edinburgh.

- The 10th Institutional Web Management Workshop was held at the University of Bath in June, opened by the Vice-Chancellor and featured a very topical programme of papers focusing on aspects of Web 2.0 and social software. Over 190 delegates attended.
- UKOLN continues to contribute to the EU-funded DELOS Network of Excellence in Digital Libraries including input to the Digital Preservation Summer School.
- In February Ariadne Web Magazine marked its tenth anniversary on the World Wide Web with a special decennial issue which was put together through a collaborative effort between the current editor and two invited former chief editors.
- There were also two further issues of the redesigned Focus on UKOLN newsletter in September and March


The chart right shows the breakdown of UKOLN funding for the period August 2005 to July 2006.

Awards

- A paper on "Implementing A Holistic Approach To E-Learning Accessibility" written by Brian Kelly of UKOLN was awarded a prize for the Best Research paper at the international ALT-C 2005 conference.
- Revealweb received a Getting the Message Across Award from the National Information Forum (NIF) on the 19th October 2005 at the Law Society, London. The awards acknowledge excellence and imagination in the provision of information to disabled people and others severely disabled by lack of appropriate information. The citation noted that "the selection panel were impressed by the innovatory aspect of the service, the fact that it is free and the sheer scale of the resource".
- Andy Powell, Assistant Director of UKOLN, was nominated for the Information World Review Information Professional of the Year Award in November 2005.
